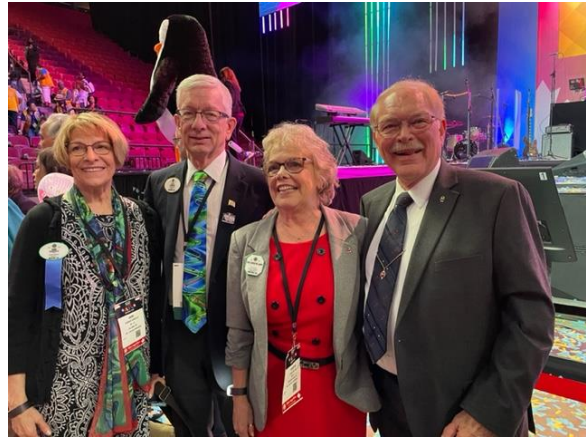

2022 International Convention, Montreal, June 24-28

We have returned from Montreal and I wanted to share the following news:

- PCC Ben Apeland was voted in at the convention as an International Director for 2022-2024! CONGRATULATIONS BEN!



- Our 1st Vice District Governor, Scott Dornfeld completed District Governor Elect training during the 2022 LCICON in Montreal. He was officially sworn in and the now Past District Governor Mike Tobin removed Scott's "Elect" ribbon to complete the transition.



- The following proposal for an increase in LCI dues was passed at the convention:

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025



THINGS TO KNOW – WHAT TO DO AND DON'T DO WHEN RECYCLING!

1. MAKE SURE GLASS ARE BEING RECYCLED FROM ALL SOURCES:
 - a. Optometrists
 - b. Eye Care Centers
 - c. Senior Centers
 - d. Funeral Businesses

2. Repack donations if possible, into a container 12 W x 12 H x 16 LG.
3. Remove these items
 - a. All loose lenses
 - b. All reader glasses
 - c. All hard cases (soft cases can be reused in shipping)
 - d. All broken frames
 - e. All standard non-prescription sunglasses
4. Pack glasses loose and neatly in the boxes
 - a. Making the shipment neat helps with the removal for inspection and cleaning.
 - b. Repack in a CLEARLY MARKED Bag or box broken frame metal frames for recycle
 - c. Add shipping label to the top side of box filled out per instruction.
 - d. Website is NWLERC Seattle, WA Northwest Lions Eye Recycling Center
5. Send: single vision (like reading glasses, Multi-vision (bifocals and trifocals), plain sunglasses (not prescription).
6. Don't send contact lenses, loose lenses or hard cases

If you do not want to mail eyeglasses, please contact your region or zone chair and arrange for a pickup.

LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL – DUES INCREASE

At the International Convention in Montreal, the membership voted for a small dues increase. It's been over 11 years since an increase has taken place. Just something to consider as we prepare club budgets when it takes effect in July of 2023.

Three dollar (\$3.00) increase starting July 1, 2023; two dollar (\$2.00) increase starting July 1, 2024 and two dollar (\$2.00) increase starting July 1, 2025.

Hello Montana Lions,

We have been receiving many reports of Lions receiving scam emails and text messages. The emails contain requests to help families with various tragedies. It may appear that the email comes from a person that you know. The texts and emails will usually ask you to go buy some gift cards and then text or email the numbers. Asking to buy gift cards and send the numbers is **always** the sign of a scam. If the email or text has a web link in it **DO NOT** click on the link.

It does not appear that either the montanalions.org or Lions Club International web sites have been hacked. Most likely your information came from someone's personal computer being infected. If you have donated via a link or gift cards, please contact your local authorities.

The 2021-22 Campaign 100 District 37 Results are in, and thanks to every club and every Lion that helped make it the most successful Campaign 100. These are the top 5 clubs according to total donations and club average donations for 2021-22. Individual donations cannot be recognized because of privacy requirements.

The top 5 clubs for total donations for 2021-22 are:

Huntley Project Lions- \$4,000
Bozeman Gallatin Empire- \$3,163.24
Billings Heights Lions- \$2670.90
Ennis Lions- \$2,625.00
Missoula Lions- \$2,500.00

The top 5 clubs average for per member donations for 2021-22 are:

Billings Heights Lions- \$133.55
Huntley Project Lions- \$121.21
Missoula Lions- \$100.00
Laurel Lions- \$76.92
Missoula South Side Lions- \$76.56.

54.1% of District 37 Lions Clubs donated, while 2.3% of Individual Lions made donations. This compares to 65.3% of Lions Clubs and 3.9% of individual Lions in the United States. Worldwide 65.3% of Lions Clubs and 7.3% of individual Lions donated to the Lions Clubs International Foundation. I do not have totals worldwide, but the \$3,000,000 goal for Campaign 100 was exceeded.

Again, I want to thank every Lions Club and every Lion that helped make Campaign 100 a success whether as an individual or as a participating club member.

I. Call to Order by DG Scott Dornfeld at 12:10

- a. Pledge of Allegiance
- b. Invocation: PDG Melody Witcher

II. Minutes: Motion by PCC Dan Krum, second by IPDG Mike Tobin to approve the February 9, 2022 minutes. Passed.

III. Financial Report: PCC Dan Krum presented the financial report. Motion by IPDG Mike Tobin, second by 1st VDG Brian Gertiser to approve the financial report. Passed.

V. Old Business

- a. 2022 District Convention – PDG Jack Beckman provided an explanation of major financial issues associated with the 2022 convention. Discussion of expenses related to the attendance of 2nd IVP Patti Hill. Motion by 1st VDG Brian Gertiser, second by IPDG Mike Tobin to accept the report. Passed.

b. International Convention

1. DG Scott Dornfeld provided a summary of his experiences at the convention; his group was paired with DGE’s from Korea,

both groups had similar solutions to situations presented for consideration; DG Scott worked as part of the election committee and was helpful in the ID campaign of Lion Ben Apeland

2. ID Ben Apeland was elected as an International Director; he supported the campaign of 2nd IVP of Patti Hill; he will serve on the Audit Committee and the Constitution and By-Laws Committee; ID Ben will serve on the Host Committee for the USA/Canada Forum being held in Calgary
- c. Grants (PDG Lary Garrison) – Major contributors to LCIF: Huntley Project, \$4000; Bozeman, \$3065; Ennis, \$2625; Billings Heights, \$2620; Missoula, \$2500.00.
 - i. Major LCIF grants include: Laurel, \$95,000 (lake project); Denton, \$90,000 (ambulance); Kalispell, \$40,000 (diabetes camp, to be held on Flathead Lake, August 15-19, \$18,000 remains on the grant); Red Lodge, \$20,000 (recovery grant, pending)
 - d. Club Health Assessment (DG Scott Dornfeld) – Many clubs are not completing and filing their required reports with LCI; district membership continues to drop; information on GST responsibilities will be provided to GST leader; club secretary training continues and is available from several sources
 - e. Website (IPDG Mike Tobin) – The site continues to be updated. Lion Peggy Tobin is doing the site updates
 - f. Club Officer Training (PDG Mile Collins) – Officer training programs are available on the website and via you tube
 - g. Leadership Retreat (PDG Mike Collins) – The retreat will be held in Helena on October 28 – 29; 124 invitations were sent to various Lions, initial returns are promising; there is a need for volunteers to help with the retreat; PID Dave Hajny suggested hosting a Woman’s Leadership Retreat possibly in 2023-2024
 - h. USA/Canada Forum (ID Ben Apeland) – Forum to be held September 15-17 in Calgary

VI. New Business

Florence Crittenton Home (Heather Greene) provided information on the operation of the home, the new facilities and the services available to, primarily residents of Montana

The cabinet approved \$250.00 to purchase a new microphone for the OWL system.

PID Dave Hajny suggested that the cabinet purchase several OWL systems for use by clubs, zone chairs and region chairs; approximately \$1000.00 each; no action was taken

IPDG Mike Tobin was presented with an award by PDG Jack Beckman associated with the 2022 district convention.

- a. 2022-2023 Cabinet (DG Scott Dornfeld) – Work continues on trying to fill positions especially the 4 remaining zone chairperson positions
- b. 2022-2023 Budget (PCC Dan Krum) – PCC Dan presented the 2022-2023 budget; cabinet members paid special attention to compensation for attendance at International Conventions and the production of a paper directory; motion by PDG Dennis Kopitzke, second by PID Dave Hajny to approve the budget. Passed.

Motion by Lion Marie Hajny, second by PDG Melody Witcher to produce a paper version of the directory. Passed. Directory will be produced in the same format and same distribution process as in the past. Word and PDF versions will be placed on the website.

Cabinet approved moving \$3807.38 (Lewistown related funds) to the district's general fund.

- c. Administrator's Report (PDG Dennis Kopitzke) – Written report provided to the cabinet
- d. Administrator's Contract (PDG Dennis Kopitzke) – Motion by PID Dave Hajny, second by PCC Dan Krum to approve the contract for 2022-2023. Passed.

- e. Directory (PDG Dennis Kopitzke) – Issue discussed and action taken earlier in the meeting.
- f. Endorsed Projects (PDG Dennis Kopitzke) – No change in the endorsed projects for 2022-2023. Steps may be taken to add the Montana School for the Deaf and Blind as an endorsed project.
- g. Club Visitations (DG Scott Dornfeld) – Plans are in place and assignments have been made to conduct club visits the Lions year.
- h. Zone/Region Reports – Reports from Lion Jon Kimble, Don Higbee and Kenny Seymour
- i. Committee Reports – Nothing from GST and GMT. PDG Mike Collins has reported on activities of GLT and PDG Lary Garrison has reported on activities of LCIF.
- j. LEO Club Start Up Grant – Funds available in the budget for LEO clubs
- k. LEO as Member of the Cabinet – DG Scott Dornfeld will collect additional information; any LEO member can attend cabinet meetings
