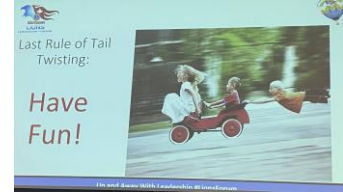
# HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2023 USA/CANADA FORUM

MINUTES – July 22, 2023 – CABINET MEETING  
Peggy Tobin – District Administrator/Secretary

Montana District 37 Cabinet Meeting, July 22, 2023; 11:30 AM; Jefferson County High School Library, 312 South Main, Boulder, MT

VIA Zoom: Regional Chair Jon Kimble, 1<sup>st</sup> VDG Raleigh Peck

1. Call to Order by DG Brian Gertiser at 11:30 AM
  - a) Pledge of Allegiance
  - b) Invocation: Zone Chair Margaret Baylinson
  - c) Introduction/Welcome – DG Brian Gertiser asked attendees to introduce themselves.
  - d) DG Comments – DG Brian noted that we need to set goals and he announced Mission 1.5 from IP Patti Hill. He and his Vice District Governors have all signed up for this which means that District 37 needs to achieve a net increase of 125 members over the next two years. Our number one goal will be to stop the bleeding and start building clubs. Brian also noted that he hasn't assigned all of his zone chairs – his goal is to find zone chairs who have a passion for membership growth.
2. Minutes: Motion by Mike Collins, second by Dan Krum to approve the April 30, 2023 minutes. Passed.
3. Financial Report: Dan Krum presented the financial report ending June 30, 2023.  
Notes: Interest on investments is turning around and income vs expenses is pretty close to budget  
Ben Apeland acknowledged Dan Krum's years of service as the District Treasurer, and that we should be looking for someone who would like to serve the district in that position.  
  
Motion by Dan Krum, second by Scott Dornfeld to approve the financial report. Passed.  
  
Dan provided copies of the 2023-2024 budget and discussion followed. Mike Collins moved to approve the budget, Dan seconded the motion and it passed.
4. Additions
  - a. Shepherd Lions request for banners
  - b. Endorsed Projects – we only have received MT Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation and Montana Youth Diabetes Association
  - c. Vests & Pins
5. Old Business

- a. LCIF Grants –Scott noted that Lary said Denton is still waiting for their ambulance. Brian reported that the kitchen equipment for Bozeman’s grant is being installed.  
Laurel – The grant has been closed  
Denton Ambulance Grant - \$75,000; delivery expected in the next few weeks
- b. Club Health Assessment - Brian reported that Anaconda has paid out all funds and is officially closed.
- c. Website Peggy reported that the current year information for the international and district level organizations has been updated as well as club directories – 13 clubs have not yet completed their PU101s. She added there was an additional cost for the club level websites that wasn’t in Deanna’s original quote and that is the purchase of a domain name if clubs didn’t have one. Peggy asked that the first year’s \$20 fee/club be paid by the district since it wasn’t in the initial information. Dave moved to pay the 1<sup>st</sup> year’s domain name cost of \$20 for those clubs who have utilized the club website from Edge Marketing. Mike seconded the motion and the motion passed.
- d. Club Officer Training (Mike Collins) – Officer training programs continue to be available on the website and via you tube. Mike noted that we will have club officer training after the release of the new program. Dave recommended that we focus training on a regional level. Mike noted that another training project is Zone Chair training regionally.

## 6. New Business

- a. Administrator’s Report (PDG Dennis Kopitzke) – Written report provided to the cabinet.
- b. Club Visitations – Brian and the VDG’s will be completing a plan for club visits.
- c. 2023 Convention Report – Brian will send a copy to Havre and will establish a convention committee to assist – Mike Tobin was recommended to work directly with the club. Dan moved to split the profit with Glendive per policy. Mike C. seconded the motion and it passed.
- d. Mission 1.5 – Ben noted that this is a two-year program. Brian is setting up four GMT’s and the region chairs have to be membership driven.
- e. 2023-2024 District directory – Already discussed
- f. Cyber Insurance Policy – Mike reviewed the exposure that exists on our website vs having personal information (health, SS#, etc). Item tabled until Mike Tobin gets pricing information.
- g. Policy Review
- h. LCIF Business Plan – Mike T. is in Chicago – table until next meeting
- i. Tri-Fold Brochure – Lary is in Chicago – table until next meeting
- j. Zone/Region Reports  
Jon reported that he had a Western Regional meeting which coincided with a park dedication and had a good club turn out (gave clubs a chance to retrieve their bells). He also noted that the firewood raffle was completed.

Margaret reported that most clubs have quit meeting over the summer. She went to Eureka to meet with Adrian. She noted that Columbia Falls will have a float for

Heritage Days next week. The Whitefish club is doing well – they have recruiting nights which are spearheaded by a member who is a veteran.

Committee Reports – Brian noted that Richard is willing to be one of the four GMTs.

7. Additional Items

- a. Shepherd Lions request for banners – Ben has a banner that might work.
- b. Endorsed Projects – we only have received MT Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation and Montana Youth Diabetes Association. Peggy will contact the other five before any action is taken.
- c. Vests & Pins – Dave recommended ordering six more. Dan moved and Margaret seconded that we order six more vests. Brian recommended having matching shirts to wear at conventions and forums. Brian will look into this and email the cabinet. Ben has sold 75 sets of the district pin set.
- d. Dave reported on our involvement in the pilot program (accountability team) on how we are going to promote leadership in the district. The committee is made up of the four GMT's, GLT (Mike C) and GST (Dennis K). Dave H has offered to chair the advisory committee and schedule monthly meetings. Discussion followed on the Governor's Manual that Mike Collins is working on.

Next meeting: October 15, approx. 10:30 am, Billings, Doubletree Hotel.
