Start planning early. Connecting Clubs and Lions to One Another

As I have traveled to Lions Clubs across Montana over the past 11 years, I have observed that while some clubs are thriving, others are struggling with membership. One thing remains constant, however: every club is providing wonderful service to its community.

Recently, I have been tracking analytics from our website, <u>montanalions.org</u>. These analytics show how many members visit the site, what pages they view, and how long they stay. What I've noticed is that, unless it is close to convention time, relatively few members visit the website in any given month.

I have also looked at convention attendance. Last year, only half of our 58 clubs had at least one member attend the state convention.

Not surprisingly, many of the clubs that are struggling are also the ones not visiting the website or attending conventions. As a result, these clubs can become isolated—from other clubs and from the district as a whole.

Because of this, I ask those of you who regularly attend conventions to reach out to those who do not. Encourage them to attend this year's convention. Consider traveling together or sharing a room. For many Lions, attending a convention alone for the first time can feel like a big step.

Sometimes all it takes is an invitation.

Just ask.

UNDERSTANDING DISTRICT 37 DUES FOR 2025-2026 LIONISTIC YEAR

District 37 will issue its annual dues invoices this month (see article below on the process). This is a good time to clarify how dues work at both the district and international levels, since the structure can feel complicated if you do not see the entire system at once.

District 37 Dues: \$25 Per Member

Every Lion in Montana is assessed \$25 per year to support the work of District 37. This figure is based on the official Lions census as of November 30, which means that clubs are billed according to the number of members recorded on that date.

District dues fund the administrative and operational needs of the district itself. This includes officer training, communication, compliance, and the support systems that help clubs function. District 37 covers only the clubs inside the borders of Montana. The district tries to strike a balance between being frugal and being able to deliver the support expected of us.

Lifetime District Membership Option

Clubs and members sometimes ask about a permanent, fixed-fee option. Like Lions International, District 37 does offer a lifetime membership, priced at 10 times the annual dues, which is currently \$250. Once paid, no future district-level dues are assessed for that individual.

All other members simply remain at the standard \$25 annual rate.

International Dues: How Regular Lions Are Billed

At the Lions Clubs International level, Regular members pay \$50 per year. LCI splits this amount into two equal charges:

- \$25 on July 1
- \$25 on January 1

This covers the full Lionistic Year (July-June).

LCI also offers several reduced-rate categories, including:

- Household Membership
- Student Membership
- Leo-Lion Membership
- And a small number of additional classifications

These categories each carry different dues amounts or discounts.

Why Dues Matter

District dues and international dues each support different parts of the Lions organization. LCI dues support global operations, insurance, program development, and international administration

District dues support Montana-specific leadership, training, and coordination. Both levels are necessary for Lions to deliver service and to maintain the shared infrastructure that makes Lions service possible.

2026 District 37 Membership Invoices Sent via QuickBooks Online

Happy New Year!

District 37 membership invoices have now been sent electronically using QuickBooks Online. These invoices were emailed directly to club Treasurers, with Presidents and Club Administrators copied whenever that information was available. In cases where a Treasurer or President email address was not listed, the invoice was sent to the Club Secretary or the next officer listed in the directory to ensure timely delivery. In the rare cases where no officers were listed or no officers had emails, those invoices were mailed directly.

Please note the following details so you can easily identify a legitimate invoice:

- Sender email: quickbooks@notification.intuit.com
- Sender name: District 37 Montana Lions

This is the standard email address QuickBooks Online uses to deliver invoices. If you see an invoice matching the details above, it is coming from the District and is valid.

That said, healthy skepticism around financial emails is reasonable and encouraged. If you ever want to verify the legitimacy of an invoice or have questions about what you received, I strongly encourage you to contact the sender directly. In this case, that is me. My phone number is listed in the District Newsletter, and I am always happy to confirm or walk through an invoice with you.

Thank you for your prompt attention to District dues and for the work you do to keep your clubs running smoothly. Clear communication and accurate records make all of our jobs easier.

Montana Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation Fellowships

Foundation Fellowship: Foundation Fellowships can now be purchased by individuals. Foundation Fellowships are used to recognize outstanding Lions and other deserving individuals. The Board of Trustees of the Foundation endorses this Fellowship. The Fellowship award includes a lapel pin and a mounted certificate and may only be bestowed by a Lions Club on an individual or group of individuals with a donation of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) to the Montana Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation.

PID Fellowship: The PID Dave Hajny, PID Tom Lehman, PID Gary Tschache and PID Ben Apeland Fellowships are now available. The fellowships recognize the contributions to Lionism made by PID's Dave, Tom, Gary and Ben. The new fellowships are a great way to provide recognition for a deserving Lion. Fellowships can be purchased for five hundred dollars (\$500) to the Montana Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation.

Life Membership: A Life Membership to the Foundation, which includes a lapel pin and pocket card can be bestowed by an individual, group of individuals, Lions Club or can be purchased by an individual with a donation of one hundred dollars (\$100) to the Montana Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation.

Memorial or Honorarium: Remember a loved one or honor that special person by donating to the Foundation. What better way to remember or honor someone than having your donation live in perpetuity? Your Memorial or Honorarium donation is never spent; only the interest earned on these assets will be used to further the purpose of the Foundation.

Club Contribution – CHANGE as of January 1, 2025

For over eight years, the Montana Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation has not made any changes to the club contribution towards applications. However, due to the increase in the cost of hearing aids and other services over that time, the Montana Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation voted at the January board meeting to increase all club contributions towards applications <u>from</u> \$200.00 or 10% of the total cost, whichever is greater <u>to</u> \$300.00 or 10% of the total cost, whichever is greater.

From "Leading the Way" Leader Dogs for the Blind Newsletter - January 2026

Happy new year, Lions! Whether your resolution is to travel more, explore new shops and stops in your community, or recruit more members for your Lions Club, we support you and wish you an amazing year.

Share Teen Programs With Your Community

At Leader Dog, we're already preparing for our summer programs for teens aged 16-17. High school-aged teens and their parents are beginning to plan for the summer, and we are ready to fill our halls. Each summer, we offer two programs for teenagers who are blind, both free of charge including travel, room and board:

Teen Summer Camp is a 1-week program in June. Up to 24 teenagers from across North America will come together for a week of fun, leadership development, and community. For many teens, our summer camp is

their first opportunity to build friendships with other teenagers who are blind. While at Leader Dog, they will rock-climb at our local Lions Bear Lake Camp, practice safe night travel, enjoy bonfires, and even practice archery.

Applications for Teen Summer Camp are open now and will be accepted until April 3, 2026. Visit <u>LeaderDog.org</u> and click 'Client Programs' to learn more and apply.

Teen Orientation & Mobility is a 1-week program offered in three sessions over the summer. **Teens will work one-on-one with a certified orientation and mobility specialist** (COMS) to learn the skills they need to map out walking routes in their community, independently cross the street, and thoughtfully problem-solve when they come across obstacles or route changes. **Each teen brings a support person**,

usually a parent, who spends the week learning how to best support their teen and how to help them advocate for themselves as they grow into independent young adults.

Some of our Plus Optix S12 users have had issues with batteries so I wanted to send a reminder to all:

The correct battery for the S12 is Eneloop, part number #BK-3MCDA8BA. They can be purchased on Amazon. Batteries should be changed out every two years and it is also important to NOT use old batteries with new batteries. Finally, NEVER use non-rechargeable alkaline or lithium batteries! - 1. Call to Order by DG Corinna Christensen at 11:00 AM
 - a. Pledge of Allegiance
 - b. Invocation: Lion Cheryl Lewis
 - c. Introductions Participants introduced themselves and what role they have in Lions
 - d. District Governor Corinna noted that it has been a great first quarter. She and her governor's team have been burning up the highways around the state and attending Forum in Atlantic City.
- 2. Minutes: Motion by Steve second by Jon to approve the August 2, 2025 minutes as distributed. Motion passed unanimously.
- 3. Financial Report: Steve reviewed the financial reports as of September 30, 2025. Mike T moved to approve the financial report and it was seconded by Jon. The motion passed unanimously. Richard asked what the interest is for the surplus funds. Steve noted that it's about 4% average as it is stepped out over time following further discussion motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Additions to the agenda are noted in Item 8 below Zone Chair Reports added in Item 5.

5. Officer Reports

a. DG/VDGs – Club Visitations – Baker was discussed. Their secretary was in an accident and they need some support to complete reporting etc. Raleigh offered to keep trying to work with them and recommended contacting the club administrator as he hasn't gotten response from the President either. Richard noted that he has tried for a couple of years and couldn't get any response. Jon reported that they work the fair and it might provide an avenue for recruiting new members. Jon provided details on his visit. They have a wild game dinner that is their largest fund raiser, etc. Potential district support for Baker to provide a park bench sign through grants and/or district funding.

Corinna, Jon and Gary provided an overview of their club visits. Corinna noted that most of the clubs are doing well but could use more members. She highlighted specific clubs such as Bozeman (noon club) and Helena Lions Club noting ongoing efforts to improve reporting and engagement.

b. Administrator's Report – Peggy reported that the website has continued to be updated for the 2025-26 fiscal year including the completion of the international officers/directors and the addition under the About/Organization of District Awards. Bozeman, Roundup and Whitefish still do not have their officer slates entered into the Lion Portal. The newsletter email format has been adjusted so that the entire article is no longer listed in the email – pictures were distorted, etc. and the goal is to drive more viewers to the website. The emails will now list the article with a "Read on the District 37 Website" link. Raleigh added that the Leo application form has been added to the website. He also needs the Charter application form added. He emphasized the need for clubs to complete the applications and report service hours. It was also noted that we need to collect memorial forms for deceased members which can be done via the website or the paper form in every newsletter.

PID Dave Hajny joined the meeting via zoom. Zone 3 Chair Margaret Baylinson joined the meeting in person.

- c. Committee Reports
 - i. GET- Jon reported that Joliet, Shephard and Seeley Lake are looking to begin Leo Clubs. Corinna noted that Margaret is going to be engaging with the campus club.
 - ii. GLT: Corinna reported that the VDG training in Bozeman was really great. Dave H asked what the cost was. Steve said he has the hotel bill/catering bill \$8,200. Gary L (and several others) said the food was great. Corinna noted that we were budgeted for \$10,000.
- iii. GMT: Corinna noted that she's very encouraged by the membership report we are now at +19. Club secretaries are being asked to keep rosters current and update their membership as changes occur. Richard is also encouraged about the new members and will be visiting Hysham (November 4th) and Forsyth (December 1st). Jon noted that he also needs to visit Hysham and is scheduled for November 18th but could reschedule and join Richard on the 4th. Margaret noted that the Campus Club has several projects.
- iv. GST- Cheryl reviewed her report. She has teamed up with Gary's club visits and its working well. She noted that there are significant barriers due to lack of computer access and expertise and emphasized the importance of follow up! Steve asked how many clubs are utilizing an admin/service chairperson to assist with the service reporting. Cheryl responded that there are very few.
- v. Zone Chair Reports **Zone 1 -** Robert reported that most of his activity has been focused on East Missoula. Seeley Lake helped them with a BBQ and he was surprised by the number of younger folks that came. He noted that Hamilton and Missoula have been doing better with reporting. He is hopeful that he has a line on a potential new club. Steve noted that there is a one-year redemption period to re-start the Southside Missoula Charter. There was additional conversation on specialty club opportunities. **Zone 3** Margaret said that her clubs are very strong with some concerns for aging clubs. She noted that Adrian is working very hard with Eureka and the Columbia Falls branch club is focusing its efforts to support the children's cancer center. **Zone 5** Lion Tom provided a written report via email.
- vi. LCIF Mike T reported that the district is on schedule at the end of the first quarter with 25% of the budgeted donations received. Fairfield has submitted a grant and it is close to being submitted for approval just waiting for a few more questions to be answered. Seeley Lake may have an application in the spring. Another application has been sent to LCIF to see if it is feasible. Mike then presented Raleigh the LCIF Presidential Award for Goal Achievement! He has talked to four clubs that do not have a Melvin Jones. Three are very receptive and he will begin club visits again now that he can drive.
- vii. Advisory Committee -- Ben described how the Advisory committee is formed and that its role is leading and guiding. Their next meeting is Friday, December 5th at 9am by zoom.
- viii. Marketing & Membership Committee -- Raleigh reported that requests for proposals were sent out and four proposals have been received. Richard expressed concerns about weak proposals and suggested reissuing requests for proposals. Raleigh is planning to set up meetings between the four companies and the committee. The budget is approximately \$30,000 based on the dues increase that was implemented when we became a single district. Richard asked if there's an infrastructure being created to manage an influx of new members/clubs. Corinna feels that we have a room full of

people who are able to help. We are smart and we can figure it out. Raleigh noted that he is a guiding lion as are Lion Dave and Jessica in the Flathead area.

6. Old Business

- a. Club Health Assessment September Richard noted that it hasn't changed much except positive growth. Discussed the clubs that are over 90 days. Steve noted that Plains hasn't paid their District Dues Gary & Cheryl will follow up with them. Dave H. suggested creating a pool of "money" to provide awards to clubs that grow by a certain number/percent. It was noted that some clubs like Kalispell had added 10 members while others remain stagnant. Various ideas were discussed including inviting clubs to participate in a 3-4 month program aimed at increasing membership with potential rewards. Mike T suggested that the district offer to pay the dues for any new members that are brought in during the next three months. We have a DCG grant that is over \$14,000 available for this effort. It was decided to create a "Club Growth Challenge Committee" to decide the best approach to take with this endeavor.
- b. 2026 District Convention— April 17th & 18th. Jessica reported that she has completed a sponsor letter to businesses in Columbia Falls (to start with) which they hope will provide funding to cover a lot of the convention costs. Following discussion, Steve moved to open a district convention account at Glacier Bank and authorize Steve D, Jessica F and Angelina Luke as the signers for the 2026 convention. Gary L seconded the motion. Mike T noted that the \$3,000 of budgeted convention funds would be placed in that account. The motion passed unanimously. The convention hotel, Cedar Creek Lodge, has 50 rooms (double occupancy rate \$109.89). The budget for all of the convention rooms, refreshments for meetings, etc. is \$2,806.89 Total food budget from the Kopper Kitchen will be \$9k. The hospitality room, vendor spaces etc. will be cozy. There could be an outside space with rented heaters depending on the weather. Glacier International Lodge next to the airport will also have some rooms reserved at approximately the same price to ensure that there are enough rooms available. Herb will be designing the pin for the convention. He said that some of the ideas include "bridging the gap".

7. New Business

a. Peggy read the Letter of Endorsement for Third VP candidate. Mike T moved to approve the Letter of Endorsement for Robert Rettby. Ben seconded the motion. He met the candidate at the forum in Atlantic City. Motion passed unanimously.

8. Additional Items – Open Discussion

- a. Jon asked if there's a way to correct a lion's years of service and Corinna said to provide her the information and she will work on that with LCI. Jon also got clarification on how a club gets the DCG grant from Mike T who noted that they have to do \$5,000 in ONE year which then triggers a grant available for the entire LCIF donations for both the current and past years.
- b. Steve noted that "go fund me" website created charity donation pages for every charity in the US without permission from the charities. They take 16% off the top of every \$\$ spent with them. He will be sending out a newsletter post with information on how to remove the page.
- c. Dave recommended that during club visits, clubs should be informed about D&O insurance. Montana Non-profit Association (MNA) has great rates.
- 9. Next Meeting Zoom Winter Meeting will be held January 10th at 9:00 am
- 10. Adjournment Steve moved to adjourn at 1:20pm. Motion seconded by Jon. Motion passed unanimously.
