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From the Desk of District Governor Jon Kimble August 2026

Fellow Lions,

In a renewed bid to broaden its impact and reverse a longstanding membership decline, Lions Clubs International (LCI) continued a multi-year strategy - Mission 1.5 - aimed at expanding both its membership and the reach of its service projects. The plan, reiterated at this year's International gathering in Hong Kong, aims to achieve 1.5 million Lions Members by the 2027 – 2028 Lions Year.

The core objective is straightforward: “more members, more service!” Lions’ service is wide given the sponsored programs: vision, health, environmental improvement, among its service programs around the world. LCI leaders emphasized that increasing enrollment is not merely about numbers, but about expanding our service to communities in need, from vision screenings in rural clinics to disaster-response relief, youth mentorship programs and diabetes awareness and treatment.

District 37 has engaged The Wendt Agency to promote Lions across Montana. The initial phase of the project will be aimed at engaging our neighbors where Lions Clubs are no longer active or have never been present. The new members and Clubs are expected to contribute to the Lions Mission, strengthen Lions in Montana, and serve more of our communities. Changes to LCI administration include:

- Expanded recruitment and onboarding: new digital tools to simplify sign-ups, streamlined mentoring for new members, and targeted outreach to women, younger professionals, and diverse communities.
- Strengthened youth and family pathways: renewed support for Leo Clubs and college-age volunteers as pipelines for future Lions, with enhanced training and project funding.
- Local-to-global service alignment: a framework to connect local clubs' service projects to broader international campaigns, improving impact visibility and collaboration.
- Strategic partnerships: collaborations with corporations, nonprofits, and government-led public health and humanitarian initiatives to provide scaled opportunities for service.

Inspire Young Artists and Promote Peace

Sponsor a 2026–2027 Lions International Peace Poster Contest

Montana Lions District 37 clubs are encouraged to sponsor the Lions International Peace Poster Contest. This year's theme is **"Harmony in Humanity"**.

The contest gives young people ages 11–13 an opportunity to express what peace, kindness and understanding mean to them through art. It is also a wonderful way for Lions clubs to connect with local families, youth leaders and community organizations while promoting the work of Lions.

Participation is not limited to schools. Clubs may also partner with:

- 4-H clubs
- Scout troops
- Boys & Girls Clubs
- Church youth groups
- Homeschool groups
- Libraries
- After-school programs
- Community art centers
- Tribal youth organizations



Montana Lions District 37 offers cash prizes for outstanding entries, and clubs may also offer local prizes or recognition.

At the international level, the grand-prize winner receives **US\$5,000**, a special award and an invitation to a Lions International event. Twenty-three merit award winners each receive **US\$500** and a certificate.

Lions International also offers a **Peace Essay Contest for students who are blind or visually impaired**, giving these young people another opportunity to share their vision of peace.



Peace Poster kits are now **available online**, so there are **no postage charges**. Each club must purchase a kit for every contest it sponsors. Clubs can also order certificates, pins and other Peace Poster supplies to use as prizes or participant gifts.

CLUB TREASURERS: SEMIANNUAL DUES INVOICES ARE READY FOR PAYMENT

Lions Clubs International issued semiannual dues invoices to every club on June 30, and they are payable now. If your club's treasurer hasn't logged into the MyLCI portal recently, this is the reminder to do it this week. **If your club's treasurer has not created an account on the portal, that is the first step to completing this process. The login is the email address that LCI has on file for each officer. If an email address has not been provided to your club secretary, you will NOT be able to create an account in the Lion Portal.**

A note for clubs used to the old process: LCI no longer mails paper invoices. Your invoice exists only in the MyLCI portal. If you're waiting on something to arrive by mail, it isn't coming, and the clock on payment is running whether or not anyone has looked.

What to do

1. Log into [MyLCI](#) using your credentials. Your login will be the email address that LCI has on file for you. (If you have changed your email address, let your club secretary know so that it can be updated in LCI.)
2. Navigate to your club's account and click on the "Statements" tab to see
3. Submit payment through the portal, or route the invoice to whoever handles your club's payments if that isn't the treasurer directly.

Unpaid dues can affect your club's standing with LCI and create complications for member transactions, so don't let this sit unchecked because no envelope showed up.

Why this matters beyond the invoice itself

LCI dues, along with District dues and any initiation fees, need to be current for your club to process new membership applications without delay. A lapsed invoice now becomes a bigger headache later, right when you're trying to onboard a new member.

Billings Lions Sponsor Free Summer Camp

The quiet stillness of the crisp morning air of the Beartooth Mountains is sharply pierced by the ringing of a cowbell, bringing the delivery of a morning wake up to the campers and counselors of the Charles Campbell Children's Camp to prepare for another amazing day at Camp!



Since 1961 the Billings Lions Club has sponsored the entirely free, week long summer camp for amazing children aged 6 to 18 with physical disabilities, but their dedication to serving others started decades earlier.

In 1946, the Billings Lions Club hosted the "Deserving Boys Camp" at the Billings Lions Beartooth Mountain Youth Camp outside of Red Lodge Montana.

The camp was first proposed by then Club President Dr. Charles D. Dean, with the getaway being touted as a "free vacation" for less fortunate boys in Billings. After a "heartily indorsement", the Lions Club sponsored the inaugural Camp July 1946 for 80 youths. The boys were first nominated by Billings school principals and educators, then selected by a committee of Lions members- boys aged 10-14 (depending on the article) boarded buses to head to the Beartooths for a week away from "financial worries" of their home lives.



The goal was to give boys the opportunity to experience the awe-inspiring freedom of the mountains - away from the struggles of home life and to hike, cook, and experience all the wonderment of nature.

The camps first director Justus (JW) Leggate spoke about the hesitancy of parents, citing financial concerns as he "emphasized the camp was an expense-free affair", with unsure parents inquiring about how much it would cost them when their sons returned.

The generosity of the Billings Lions Club sponsorship of the Camp was achieved after "the problem of financing such an undertaking presented the next hurdle" and the solution becoming the first annual "Lions Club Minstrel Show" bringing in \$1,100, "assuring ample funds for the first year. The camp ran for at least 6 years, and its impacts have affected generations.

Today the Charles Campbell Children's Camp, named after Montana's only back to back Past District Governor Charles "Chuck" Campbell (1972-1974) who was instrumental in persuading the Billings Lions Club to assume the camp after the Elks Club could no longer run it, offers youth an amazing opportunity to experience nature in the Beartooths while escaping the sometimes tumultuous "real world".



Camp offers kids freedom from parents, doctor appointments, ridicule, and allows them to just be a kid while being goofy, crazy, and full of energy. Our amazingly dedicated volunteer counselors have come from all over the United States and the world to give of their time, talents, energy, and love of humanity. Many of the counselors return year after year and form life-long friendships with their fellow counselors and campers.

This year's camp had 25 campers and 26 counselors, along with 18 volunteer staff members including many Billings Lions Club members. Each year we have a multitude of activities planned including crafts, a hike, archery and ax throwing (kid appropriate), a splash park, a dance, theme night, a movie night, and a host of other adventures for the week.



The Camp is supported by the rental of the Billings Lions Beartooth Mountain Youth Camp during the summer to other youth groups an opportunity to experience the mountains. Our camp has been around since the 1920s, being built by the Civilian Conservation Corps while they worked on the Beartooth Highway.

Camp is an amazing place where innumerable memories have been made and countless lives have been impacted by those who follow the Lions mantra of "We Serve" by giving their time and love for humanity and service to others.

Call to Order by DG Corinna Christensen at 923 AM

- a. Pledge of Allegiance
 - b. Invocation: Lion Melody
 - c. Introductions – Participants introduced themselves and what role they have in Lions
 - d. District Governor – Opening Remarks – results of convention 125 in attendance – 5 no shows. Out of our 58 clubs, 33 MT Clubs were represented (57%)! Leo attendance was great. It was recommended to include the Leo's in our future cabinet meetings. Jerry K noted that the Leos are in his zone and they intend to become lions and bring along others.
2. Minutes – Peggy asked if there were any changes to the minutes. Dan moved to approve the January 10, 2026 minutes as distributed. Mike C seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
 3. Financial Reports: Steve apologized for not having a balance sheet. Mike T moved to approve the financial reports and motion was seconded by Raleigh. The motion passed unanimously.
 4. Additions to the agenda are noted in Item 8 below
 5. Officers Reports
 - a. DG/VDG's – Jon reported on his visit to Hysham. Mark Manning will be the new zone chair. He is putting their secretary and treasurer in touch with Peg & Steve to improve their reporting. He also recruited a Zone 2 chair out of Superior. Gary reported that his visits are complete except for Plains which is scheduled. Corinna visited Laurel and will be in Sunburst next week. She also reported that the google form system for club visit reports has been very useful. She requested that Steve add the google form link to the website for governor and zone chair visits and service chairs. (NOTE: It was later decided not to do this, but instead a reminder email with a link to the form will be sent out). Discussion followed regarding outstanding expenses not covered by LCI. DG Corinna will apply for additional expenditure reimbursements to be sure the amount gets included in next year's budget.
 - b. Administrator's Report – Peggy reported that she set up the 2026 convention on the website as the committee provided information, adding various aspects as we got closer. She updated the "Our Causes" pages with the new icons now being used by LCI, added more tools such as the LCI Service Ideas. Posting club news, creating the newsletter, posting all articles online as well as still providing the pdf version of the newsletter for downloading is an ongoing process every month. She also setup the election for the convention. She thanked Steve D for his April Fool's joke on the "First of the Month" April newsletter post.

- c. Zone/Region Reports – **Zones 6 & 7** – Jerry reported that Turner had two new members but they haven't been entered in portal yet. Keith is their new secretary following the passing of Johannas Brown, the club's longtime secretary. Jerry volunteered at the Blaine county fair and he reached out to all of Zone 6's clubs. He's very been involved with Fort Benton and was able to get the Leo's club back on the portal. He also reported that IDG Jon will move Fort Benton to Zone 7 and find a new Zone 6 chair which will help Jerry a lot. **Zone 1** – Rob reported that the clubs are doing well. Each club has its own set of circumstances, issues, etc. and they are all different. Hamilton has been good about taking the suggestions and trying new things (example – they now have two meetings – one at noon and one in the evening). East Missoula is an ongoing project – aging out. Seeley Lake has been assisting with their main project. He reported that they are also working on a new club in Potomac and is hoping the new marketing group can assist with reaching that area. **Zone 5** - Tom reported that he has stayed in touch with White Sulphur Springs via phone. There is a strategic plan that they can all access. Gold Rush Lions have a two-year plan for their officers. Their Calcutta resulted in \$3,200 for the club (10%). They have a “zone committee” that formed for last year's convention that is continuing to work together. **Zone 13** – Julie reported that she has traveled with DG Corinna extensively but did not understand the position. She had a private meeting with her local club's president (which has DG as a member). Met with the Bozeman Lions and only has about three active members – recommended changing the time of the meeting (noon) to accommodate working members. She's looking forward to moving forward with a better understanding of the process. **Zone 3** – Margaret reported on her clubs – most don't have large meeting attendance but they do a lot of activities (Whitefish as an example – changed their meeting time and have zoom meetings). Columbia Falls is a strong club – Earth Day project was yesterday. Also have a playground project. Kalispell Sunrisers have a very good core – they just had a fish derby. Kalispell noon club – they have an ornament project in association with a local artist. She also reported on the branch clubs. The campus club is very different because of their class schedules, etc. Columbia Falls enjoys doing projects including a blanket project and Shoes for Souls (Soles for Souls). **Zone 14**– Melody – Winnett & Roundup have 95% & 100% attendance at meetings. Denton is 2 ½ hours away – very remote and she hasn't visited them yet. Jon reminded the zone chairs to complete the google club visit form.
- d. Committee Reports
1. GET- Jon reported that he has a lead for Libby - Margaret and Adrian have offered to help. He was approached by Ennis to assist with starting a Leo club. Lion Mike C. also reported that Lewistown will be the location of the fall leadership training and have discussed approaching a club there too. He, Lion Cheryl & Gary will be attending the Mission 1.5 conference.
 2. GLT: Mike C. reported that our zoom officer meetings were completed. We had some attendees from Wyoming. Convention training was largest attendance he has seen. Lewistown will be the location for our Leadership Training October 2-3.
 3. GMT: Richard feels we need three co-chairs in the state and need a better connection with the zone chairs to catch any issues with clubs. We lost some clubs this year, but haven't lost membership as a district. He is stepping down but will be happy to assist with finding a replacement. DG Corinna thanked Richard for all his years.
 4. GST: Cheryl reported that they took a 2-month rest to Arizona.
 5. LCIF – Mike T reported \$14,200 from the convention – three-quarters of the way to their goal. Grants are coming in. Possibility of three matching grants going thru the process. He is working with the seven clubs that have never had a Melvin Jones and he has two clubs that are actively

working on getting their portion raised. PDG Lary is stepping back as co-chair but is not going away. PDG Raleigh will join Mike as Co-Chair.

6. Advisory Committee – no report.

7. Policy & By-Laws – Mike T reviewed the recommendation to update Article 3, Section E (see attached). Dan K moved to approve, Steve D seconded the motion. No Discussion. Motion passed unanimously. Mike asked the question “why do we have endorsed projects” to think about for a future discussion. IP Ben said that the reason was that the group was “vetted” and the clubs could donate to them.

6. Old Business

- a. Club Health Assessment – March (see attached report) – reviewing the report, DG Corinna has a concern for the number of clubs that are at least 90 days past due on LCI dues. DG will split up the list with the VDG’s to get clubs caught up.
- b. 3rd Vice District Governor – PDG Brian recommended that the 3rd VDG be picked from the Zone Chair. Richard doesn’t feel it should be a zone chair. Jon asked if anyone would volunteer for the position. Cory Sena offered to discuss with his club if there’s a duty description.
- c. Marketing Program – adopt previous action item completed via email to approve the hiring of Wendt as the marketing agency for District 37’s Marketing Program (Final vote – 29 cabinet members – 19 voted yes, 1 abstained, 9 did not vote). Contract is not signed yet. DG noted that the contract is for up to \$50,000 altho we may or may not spend that much. We can run the contract through LCI legal. Discussion followed regarding the \$5,000 grant that was received last year – Mike C noted that Lakeside was the target area but they couldn’t find anyone to “lead”.
 - i. Leadership to interact with Wendt – Raleigh, Steve, Cory
 - ii. Social Media Integration – Steve is experimenting and it seems to be working.

7. New Business

- a. Proposal to approve continuation of Administrator’s contract for Tobin Trails Inc for 2026-27 – Raleigh moved to approve the contract. Jon 2nd the motion. Mike C. asked if an increase is needed. Peggy said she’s fine with the existing contract. IP Dave asked for the quarterly report to be reinstated. Question called. Motion passed unanimously.
- b. Proposal to approve Treasurer for Steve Dogiakos for 2026-27 year. Mike T moved and Dan C seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- c. Informal 2026 Convention Report...Formal Report to Follow. Richard requested a list of attendees and their clubs. Peg will complete the convention report for election results for Corinna to submit.
- d. 2027 District Convention Discussion – Chateau – Steve was asked and confirmed that he is currently the Convention Chair. Raleigh asked what happens to the sponsor \$\$ raised. Steve provided that information – any amounts remaining after the convention may be split between the club and the district convention account. The goal is to reduce the registration costs, etc.
- e. Dave Falcon – request assistance for travel expenses to Plus Optix Summit in Atlanta – August 17-19, 2026 – Lion Dave reported that they are planning their first summit meeting for Plus Optix – Dave and Teresa would be traveling. Their airfare will be \$1,096 for both. Room is \$349/night and transfers from and to the airport. Estimated \$2,500 – Motion by Dave H. and seconded Jon K. to provide up to \$2,500. Call for Question. Motion passed unanimously.

8. Additional Items

- a. District Vests – Lion Melody modeled the vest – Dave has 4-5 vests that haven't been embroidered. Raleigh moved to provide \$500 to purchase more vests. Melody seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.
- b. DG Corinna would like to create a community engagement committee with Cory Sena.
- c. Bank Account for Fairfield LCIF grant – Steve moved to adopt the executive committee action to form the bank account for the Fairfield LCIF Grant. Motion was seconded by Mike C. and carried unanimously.

9. Next Meeting: - July 12, 2026 at noon at the Great Falls MT School for the Deaf and the Blind following the MT Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation meeting at 10am. Lunch will be provided.
